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Supporting Reading

Reading is the best ways to support learners in expanding their knowledge of language, vocabulary and skills in reading. You can:

- Encourage pupils to read aim for an hour a week at home. This will make a HUGE difference.
- Access the library to give pupils the opportunity to read a range of texts. Chat with library staff for recommendations – they are the experts!
- Pupils visit the library once a fortnight during their English lessons for book talks from the library staff on various themes; an excellent way to get inspired to read!
- Encourage pupils to access the library trolley, which is made available in the English Department on a weekly basis a practical way to return, renew or borrow books, right on their doorstep!
- Encourage pupils to use online dictionaries to widen vocabulary and develop understanding www.meriam-webster.com/word-of-the-day
- Encourage pupils to check out online resources:
 - Scottish Book Trust take part in "reading lunches", (which motivate pupils to enjoy
 a good read while eating their lunch), watch online clips of recommended books, and
 become part of a virtual book club.
 - The Literacy Trust here you can find competitions, reading challenges and recommended texts, both written and audio.
- Access free online written and audio texts:

 - Audible UK
- Access free online talks on various educational topics at: ed.ted.com. Pupils use 'Ted Talks' in
 class as a method of enhancing their listening skills. At home, it can be used to further develop
 these skills, or as preparation for discursive writing or talk tasks.
- Complete the Reading Awards during S1 and S2 Bronze, Silver and Gold. The Reading Awards are an excellent way of ensuring reading for pleasure and all pupils who have completed a Reading Award receive a certificate for their hard work.
- Attend the S1 Reading Café Thursday at lunchtime.

Supporting Writing

To support developing creative writing skills, pupils should focus on the golden rule – SHOW don't TELL. At home you can:

- Encourage pupils to focus on using the senses, imagery and a wide and varied vocabulary to make writing vivid and interesting for the reader.
- Access the website youngwriters.co.uk. Here you will find poetry and short story competitions throughout the year, which could lead to prizes and publication.

To support discursive writing skills, pupils must ensure their ideas are well-research and well-structured. At home you can:

• Discourage use of Wikipedia for research – information cannot be verified.

To support personal reflective skills, pupils must write about their experiences, including thoughts, feelings and a sense of reflection. At home you can:

- Encourage use of activities to develop writing:
 - ✓ Blogger.com a website with access to free materials for pupils creating their own online blogs about themselves.
- Encourage pupils to keep a diary of their daily or weekly activities, including thoughts, feelings and reflections.

To support language and grammar skills, at home you can:

- Encourage pupils to always check over work carefully. Pupils must self-assess their writing before submission and this is an important element of developing writing skills.
- Pupils are familiar with 'Green Pen Marking' in class as a regular means of self-assessing, peer-assessing and evaluating their work: proof-reading at home will further support this.
